150th
Anniversary
of the
Discovery of the
Fassifern Valley

The monument commemorates the 150th Anniversary of the European discovery of the Fassifern Valley by Patrick Logan.

He became an avid explorer of Moreton Bay and its hinterland while Commander of the Penal Settlement. The greatest expansion of the settlement took place under his command.

Captain Logan led several expeditions which added to geographical knowledge. In August 1826 he discovered the Logan River and next May the Albert River. In 1828, with Allan Cunningham and Charles Fraser, he succeeded in climbing Mount Barney, (1356 meters), then the highest altitude attained by a non-aboriginal man in Australia.

In July 1830 he led an expedition to the headwaters of the Richmond River and on his return, since the regiment was due for transfer to India, he attempted to chart the windings of the upper Brisbane River. He never succeeded for he was killed by Aboriginals on 17 October in the region of Mount Beppo.

These mountains and valleys of the Great Divide and MacPherson Ranges were first explored by Patrick Logan Commandant of Moreton Bay Settlement 1826 - 1830

He camped in this valley June 9-10, 1827 when his friend explorer Allan Cunningham, discoverer of the Darling Downs was camped at Logan Vale just beyond double - top Mount Mitchell on the skyline

Cunningham passed through this Valley, August 18-29 1828 to discover Cunningham's Gap through which this National Highway passes

"And so, to point the way -And wake with voices of today The silence of primeval years."


#### Rathmines RAAF Memorial, NSW



#### Bridge Creek War Memorial Bridge Brooweena

A few years ago my husband and I were on a caravan trip in Queensland. We passed through the small town of Biggenden and turned into the Brooweena-Woolooga Road and continued in the direction of Kilkivan. We passed through undulating grassy countryside. Along the way we came to a creek crossing and saw this unusual War Memorial. We had to stop and investigate. I have now found the story and it is rather moving.

A timber bridge over a small creek

west of Maryborough leads nowhere today, yet it stands as a tribute to a family's nationalism post - World War 1. It was designed and funded by Mr. Lawrence Stevens Smith of Mount Joseph Station and is the only known privately-funded memorial bridge in Queensland, perhaps even Australia.

Apart from the masonry piers which were built by Frederick William Webb the builder, the bridge was built by station hands, some of whom were returned servicemen.



A local minister, the Reverend Hardingham, officially opened the bridge on the 21st May 1921. A bereft local mother, Mrs A. Brown, unveiled the honour roll. Her son was among the nine from the area who died in the war.

White painted sandstone pillars carry leaded marble plaques remembering both those who died and the 38 who returned.

Memorials erected across the nation during and after WW1 expressed the nation's grief for 60.000 Australians who died and were buried overseas. Although the Smiths lost no sons in WW1, they wished to make their own commemorative gesture and hand-



ed the bridge over to Woocoo Shire Council on completion.

The bridge remained in use until 1972 when it was replaced. Soon after, the Smith family installed a commemorative cairn to explain its historic significance to picnic-goers and passers-by.



### Overland Telegraph Line Adelaide to Darwin

When you are on holiday in a new place it is good to be able to walk around the cities and towns. You see so many interesting things. On our first trip to the Northern Territory in 2013 we visited our nephew in Darwin for 5 days and then hired a campervan and drove from Darwin to Alice Springs via Kakadu National Park and Uluru.

One thing that stood out in our exploring of Darwin City was the discovery of a cairn near Parliament House and opposite Government House.

#### The plaque read:



This was an interesting thing to find. At school in Adelaide we learned about the early explorers and how John McDougal Stuart put through the first overland telegraph line from Adelaide to Darwin to connect Australia to Europe. This cairn was built from the stone from the first permanent station in 1872. As we travelled south to Alice Springs we saw the restored Barrow Creek Telegraph Station and at Alice Springs we visited the old Telegraph Station where we saw old telegraph poles, Morse code machines, etc. It was a mammoth task putting through this line.

The amazing thing is that today you can see the modern repeater poles along the highway as you travel so communication is still up and running

#### Some Golden Rules of Genealogy

#### 'SPELING DUSN'T COWNT'

Back in the day, folks couldn't spell and many could barely write, so how a name sounds is more important than how it is spelled. Use wild card or Soundex searches to help find variant spellings of surnames.

#### ASSUME NOTHING

Check all your facts, don't assume that any particular document is right or wrong, and always try to find other independent sources to corroborate your facts as much as possible.

Verify, verify, verify.

For instance, don't assume:

- That your ancestors were married
  - Census information is correct
- Vital (other) records were correct
   Your ancestors life events were recorded
- Ancestors had the same names as their enslaver

#### USE DISCRETION

Never lie in your genealogy reports, but use discretion when reporting family information, especially when it involves living relatives.

## The Mafeking Bell at Mount Morgan Qld



The bell was cast in 1900 to commemorate the relief of Mafeking in the South African Boer War (1899 – 1902) and was originally installed in the tower of the Council Chambers, then transferred to the front verandah in 1925 when the tower was demolished. The bell was cast by George Frederick Gray who worked in the smelter at the time. He sailed to Australia in the Quetta on one of its last voyages before it sank in the Torres Strait.

The Mafeking Bell at Mt. Morgan



In 1960-61 the bell was discovered lying in grass at the Shire Chambers yard by members of the Local Scout Group and knowing that Lord Baden-Powell was the instigator of the Relief of Mafeking and the Founder of the Boy Scout application Movement made to the council to have the bell erected at the Scout Hut. In 1962 it was erected on a stand at the Scout Hut at Glen Gordon and moved to its present site in 1968.

The bell has also been used to:

- (a) Mark the passing of time for townspeople during the closure of the mine from 1925 1929 when the mine's hooter was not operating.
- (b) Rang during peace celebrations held at the end of World Wars One and Two
- (c) Used to indicate fire before the local fire brigade was established in 1942.
- (d) Rang out on New Year's Eve to mark the passing of the old year.

Mafeking was held for 218 days by British and Australian troops under the command of Colonel Robert Baden-Powell, before being relieved by troops under Lord Roberts on 17th May 1900.



The plaque under bell reads:

Mafeking Bell. This bell was cast in 1900 from pennies donated by Mount Morgan school children to commemorate The Relief of Mafeking. The defence of Mafeking was under the command of Lord Baden-Powell who later founded the Boy Scout movement.

Presented by the Mount Morgan Shire Council. October 1962.


He accompanied Flinders on many of his adventures over the next four years, until Flinders was detained on Mauritius in 1803 for six years, owing to England and France being at war at the time.

## Alfred Finis Schweitzer

Alfred Schweitzer was born in Beenleigh on the 28th June 1890. His parents were born in Germany and immigrated to Queensland in the 1870's. Franz Schweitzer and Albertine Gehrke were married in Queensland in 1881, they had 16 children. In 1895, Alfred was enrolled in Beenleigh School.

The 1913 electoral roll shows Alfred living in Murgon and working as a plumber. After this date, there seems to be no mention of Alfred in electoral rolls, AIF records or newspapers apart from one article mentioned below. Alfred enlisted as Arthur John Smith.

#### **Arthur John Smith**

On the 14th October 1916, Arthur enlisted in the AIF in Townsville, he was 27 years old, a plumber and unmarried. He stated on his enlistment form that he was born in Beenleigh on the 26th August 1889. The next of kin on enlistment was noted as a friend, Miss Mary Watkins.

Arthur was assigned to the 23rd Reinforcement of the 9th Battalion, Reg No 7059 with the rank of Private.

On November 17th 1916, Arthur embarked on the HMAT A55 Kyarra in Brisbane and disembarked in Plymouth in January 1917. In February 1917, he marched into the 3rd Training Battalion in Durrington.

Arthur was admitted to Parkhouse Hospital in March 1917 with mumps. In May, he proceeded overseas to France via Folkstone and marched in to the 1st Australian Division Base Depot in Etaples. Private Smith was taken on strength with the 9th Battalion on the 11th May 1917.

On the 20th September 1917, Arthur was reported as Missing In Action. Following a Court of Inquiry in early 1918, he was listed as Killed In Action. There is no known grave.

On 4th October 1919, an article

appeared in the Daily Examiner Grafton giving the following details: 'Mr A E Schweitzer received word that his brother, Private Alfred Schweitzer, had been killed at Ypres, France on September 20, 1917. For the past two years no word has been received from him and it was thought he was a prisoner of war in Germany. Now that the Diggers are all returning, inquiries were put about and the above (wording) is the result.'

Arthur John Smith is honoured on the Menin Gate Memorial Bay 17, Stone N, and the Australian War Memorial, Panel 57 as A J Smith.

Alfred Schweitzer is honoured on the Beenleigh War Memorial as A Schweitzer.
